- Most of the Middle East is located in Asia, but as well in Africa and in Europe.

- Several major religions have their origins in the Middle East.
- It generally has a hot, arid climate.
- There are several major rivers providing irrigation and in many countries crude oil is extracted.

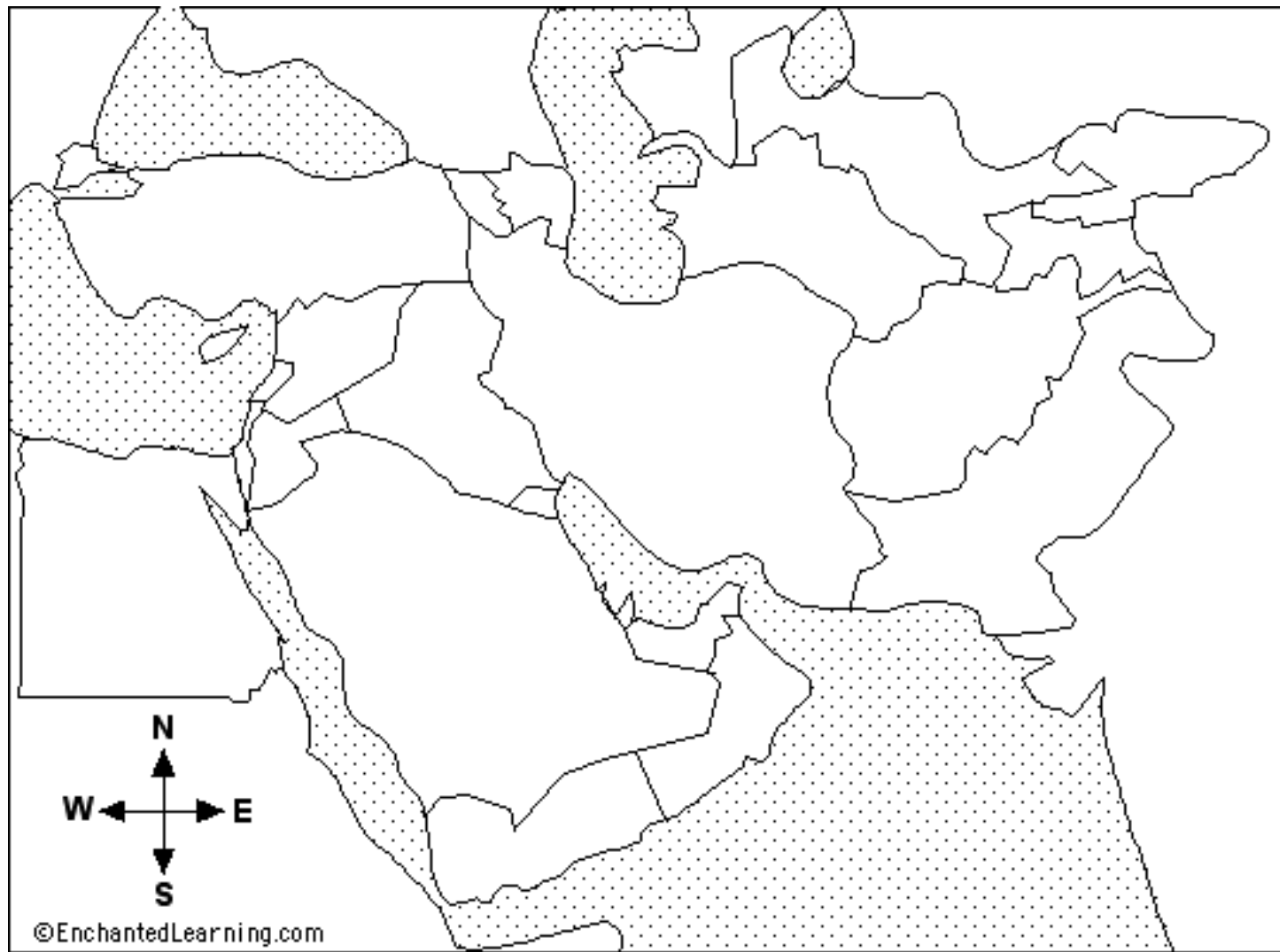
